## Abstract

During the Bucknell in Dublin study abroad program, I balanced academic coursework, a professional internship, and extensive cultural exploration. Academically, I completed ACFM 315: Judging Justice, where I compared Irish and U.S. Supreme Court rulings and deepened my understanding of the differences between the two legal systems, as well as MGMT 290: Management in a Global, Societal, and Cultural Context, which emphasized experiential learning through internships and cultural engagement rather than traditional classroom lectures. Professionally, I interned at TASC – Think-tank for Action on Social Change as a Research Support Intern, where I developed critical skills in policy research, legal and economic analysis, and report proofreading while contributing to projects on Irish pension schemes and Actual Individual Consumption studies. Beyond academics and professional work, I immersed myself in Irish culture through excursions to sites throughout Ireland, while also taking advantage of opportunities to travel internationally to Austria and Portugal. These experiences enriched my understanding of global perspectives, strengthened my adaptability and independence, and left me with lifelong memories of academic growth, professional development, and cultural exploration.

### Course Work

Over the course of the summer, I took two courses: Management in a Global, Societal, and Cultural Context taught by Dean Kepner and Judging Justice taught by Professor Aikey.

## MGMT 290: Management in a Global, Societal, and Cultural Context

The management class ran differently than a traditional lecture class. We never actually met in an in-person classroom; instead, our leaning came through active engagement in our internships, weekend excursions around Ireland, and occasional assignments such as completing LinkedIn Learning courses and writing a weekly blog. The class structure allowed me to immerse myself fully in Irish society and explore how cultural and societal differences influence management practices.

## ACFM 315: Judging Justice- A Comparative Study of Irish and U.S. Supreme Court Rulings

The Judging Justice class met once a week on Mondays from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. in a classroom at University College Dublin. Throughout the course, I studied landmark legal cases from both Ireland and the United States, gaining a deeper understanding of how the two countries' legal frameworks differ. Following our morning lectures, we went on day trips to various historical and cultural sites around Dublin that connected to the themes of justice and law. Some of my favorite Monday excursions included visiting the Guinness Storehouse and the Kilmainham Gaol Prison. I learned a great deal in this class about landmark Supreme Court cases in Ireland and the United States and how to compare the two legal systems.




## Internship
